As mandated by the Mutual Educational and Cultural Exchange Act of 1961, the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs (ECA) works to build friendly, peaceful relations between the people of the United States and the people of other countries through academic, cultural,

sports, and professional exchanges, as well as public -private partnerships.

ECA builds networks through academic, professional, youth, sports, cultural, and private exchanges, as well as through cultural heritage preservation. ECA funds more than 55,000 exchange participants each year, both Americans who travel abroad and international visitors to are hosted in all 50 states. Overall, ECA has had over one million program participants to date, including more than 75 Nobel Laureates and nearly 450 current and former heads of state and government.

The Community College Administrator Program (CCAP) was established in 2008 to support the development of higher education by expanding the capacity of key educators and administrators from technical and vocational institutions with connections to economically disadvantaged and historically underserved populations in local communities. From 2008 to 2018, nearly 300 participants from nine countries have learned about the community college model and how these institutions throughout the United States partner with business and industry to promote workforce development in their local communities.

The CCAP is a program of the Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs of the United States Department of State, supported by the people of the United States, and implemented by Florida State University in partnership with Santa Fe College.

COMMUNITY COLLEGE ADMINISTRATOR PROGRAM WITH UKRAINE

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The Community College Administrator Program (CCAP) with Ukraine is a five-week program of study for officials with higher education planning responsibilities and administrators from post-secondary vocational and technical institutions. Conducted by Florida State University and Santa Fe College, the exchange will consist of a one-week Executive Dialogue and a four-week Community College Seminar. The CCAP is a U.S. Department of State exchange program.

EXECUTIVE DIALOGUE

Designed to provide an overview of the U.S. community college system and explore each nation's development of community academies. Higher education officials and administrators from Ukraine will meet with legislative leaders and senior policy- makers of the Florida Community College System in order to provide a comprehensive understanding of the development, organization and administration of a U.S. community college system integrally linked to secondary education, higher education and the workforce training needs of business and industry. In addition to the administrators, the program will support high-level higher-education officials to participate in the Executive Dialogue.

FOUR-WEEK COMPARATIVE COMMUNITY COLLEGE SEMINAR

Designed to train administrators of post-secondary vocational and technical institutions or officials with higher education planning responsibilities in key elements of community college leadership, to provide direct exposure to the day-to-day administrative responsibilities and challenges of a U.S. community college and investigate specific community college academic and vocational programs relevant to the needs of participants' home institutions.

OBJECTIVES

- Demonstrate enhanced ability to effectively address governance and policy questions integral to the establishment of a community college system relevant to Ukraine's context;
- Contribute to the present and future demands for policy formulation, continuous planning, program management decision making and day- to-day administration of community academies in Ukraine;
- Explore aspects the U.S. higher education system and provide a more comprehensive understanding of the U.S. community college administration;
- Articulate the unique and important opportunities created through merging academic, business and management skills through the community college system; and
- Encourage on-going collaboration between Ukraine and U.S. counterparts involved in community college administration.



FORMAT

Classroom Instruction. 20 hours per week of intensive instruction by graduate faculty of the Florida State University College of Education, former officers of the State of Florida Community College System, and current Santa Fe College administrators.

Small Group Discussions. Participants will have opportunities for discussions and one-on-one interactions with college administrators.

Site Visits. Targeted site visits to Florida community colleges to investigate academic/ vocational programs or administrative practices of relevance to participants and their home institutions.

AUDIENCE

The program will fund the participation of four senior-level officials to participate in the one-week Executive Dialogue. The Executive Dialogue will be the last week of the Community College Administrator program and will also include the administrators. Interpretation services will be available for the Executive Dialogue if needed. The program will fund senior-level administrators from post-secondary vocational and technical institutions and policy makers with higher education planning responsibilities to participate in the one-week Executive Dialogue and the four-week Seminar.

DURATION

Five weeks total, September 8 – October 14, 2018 Includes a one-week Executive Dialogue and a four-week Community College Seminar.

As a former educator/full-time university professor, Ms. Royce led an international grant program between two universities. She has engaged many federal government agencies and served on 20 non-profit boards. She also served as a private sector appointee on the Advisory Committee on International Communications and Information Policy (ACICIP) at the State Department, in addition to serving on two U.S. Cultural Exchange Boards. She traveled as an American Council of Young Political Leaders (ACYPL) delegate to Hungary and Poland. The American Women for International Understanding (AWIU) recognized her with their Internationalism Award. Ms. Royce earned a BSBA (double major) at California State Polytechnic University, Pomona and an MBA at Georgetown University in International Business, with honors, Beta Gamma Sigma. She is the recipient of the Distinguished Alumni Award from California State Polytechnic University, Pomona.

Ambassador Jennifer Zimdahl Galt is the Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary (PDAS) for Educational and Cultural Affairs (ECA). She joined the Bureau on November 13, 2017. The Bureau advances U.S. foreign policy objectives through educational, professional, cultural and sports exchanges that promote mutual understanding between the people of the United States and people of other nations and create networks and partnerships to advance U.S. foreign policy goals and address global challenges and opportunities.

Prior to joining ECA, Ms. Galt was Ambassador of the United States of America to Mongolia from 2015-17. A career member of the State Department's Senior Foreign Service with the rank of Minister Counselor, Ambassador Galt formerly served as Principal Officer of the U.S. Consulate General in Guangzhou, China, where she had the privilege of leading and mentoring a talented team of nearly 500, of whom 62 were first- and second-tour officers. Ambassador Galt's previous postings overseas have included Belgrade, Taipei with the American Institute in Taiwan, Mumbai, Beijing, Shanghai, and the U.S. Mission to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization in Brussels. In Washington, Ambassador Galt served as Senior Advisor in the State Department's Bureau of Public Affairs and as Deputy Director for Public Diplomacy in the Bureau of East Asian and Pacific Affairs.

Ambassador Galt holds Masters' degrees from National Defense University and Johns Hopkins University School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS), as well as a Bachelor's degree in political science, history and languages from Colorado College in her home state of Colorado. She was awarded an Honorary Doctorate of Juris Prudence from Colorado College in 2016. She is fluent in Mandarin and French, and also speaks Italian, Spanish and Serbian. Ambassador Galt is married to the writer Fritz Galt and has a daughter and a son.






The community college movement in the United States is usually thought of as beginning in 1901, with the establishment of Joliet Junior College in Illinois. Over the last century, that movement has grown to encompass more than 1,000 public community colleges all across the country, enrolling close to eight million students each year-- the largest single sector in American higher education. The uniquely American character of the community college--with its emphasis on equal opportunity, open access, and economic development--will form the basis of Dr. Milligan's presentation.


While there will be an opening presentation of an overview of the framework and its functional development concepts, the CCAP participants will be organized into groups to do a general assessment of their own national higher education system development related to the framework above within their national and local context. A summary discussion of the group outcomes will follow, and the session will conclude with a summary discussion of the uses of the conceptual and functional framework and concepts in participant visits to government agencies in Tallahassee, at Santa Fe College and elsewhere, especially to assess the applicability of the development of the Florida system and its colleges to their own national or local context.



Dr. Toby Park, Associate Director, Center for Post-Secondary Success, Associate Professor, Department of Educational Leadership and Policy Studies, Florida State University

This session describes student pathways in American community colleges. Using case studies in Florida, Texas and Pennsylvania, this session will cover how students accrue credits, how credits are retained during the transfer process, and examples of policies that could improve both. Dr. Park also will explore college readiness in community colleges, including the role of placement tests and developmental education. Recent policy shifts across several U.S. states will be presented as models for how different systems handle educating students who may need additional academic preparation. Florida, the state that initiated the most radical reform policy in this area, will be discussed at length.




